The Kolleg is named after the administrative lawyer and member of the German resistance Carl Friedrich Goerdeler (1884–1945).

## The Kolleg enables you to

- :: gain further qualification in seminars and actively participate in discussions and project workshops,
- :: establish contacts in Germany, the EU and participants' countries, and
- :: contribute to the development of good governance and administrative reforms.

## The program is comprised of four elements:

- :: a three-week seminar in Berlin and Warsaw from August 31 to September 21, 2013,
- :: project implementation in your home country from October 2013 to August 2014,
- :: a mid-term seminar in February 2014, and
- :: a concluding seminar in Berlin in August 2014.

- :: a university degree with outstanding grades,
- :: first professional experience in the public sector (public administration, public companies, non-profit organizations, etc.) and support from your employer,
- :: a specific idea for a project and an interest in good governance and policy,
- :: social responsibility and engagement, leadership qualities, and
- :: very good knowledge of German and knowledge of English.

The working language is German.

The Robert Bosch Stiftung will cover travel expenses, accommodation costs, seminars and (if necessary) a German language course, as well as an allowance of 400 euros.
